Lesson Twelve

- 1. **heresy** (her ise) noun a religious belief opposed to the established doctrine During the Inquisition those found guilty of heresy were burned at the stake.

 syn: heterodoxy, nonconformity ant: conformity, orthodoxy
- 2. **hoax** (hōks) *noun* a practical joke

 The footprints which they thought to be those of Bigfoot turned out to be a *hoax*.

 syn: deception, fraud
- 3. **hue** (hyōō) *noun* that quality which makes one color differ from other colors; a particular shade or tint of a given color

 We were going to paint the house forest green, but my mother cannot stand that particular *hue*.
- 4. **humility** (hyōō mǐl´i tē) *noun* absence of vanity
 There was a lot of *humility* in his voice as he begged the girl to stay.

 syn: modesty, humbleness ant: haughtiness, arrogance
- 5. **hurtle** (hûr'tl) *verb* to dash; to move swiftly and with great force
 The big fullback *hurtled* his way through the defensive line and scored the winning touchdown.

 syn: to plow into
- 6. hyperbole (hī pûr' bə lē) noun extreme exaggeration for effect and not meant to be taken literally
 While his stories are very enjoyable, you cannot believe every word because he does engage in hyperbole.
- 7. **hypercritical** (hī pər krǐt´ i kəl) *adj.* overly critical; too severe in judgment In his inspection of the barracks, the sergeant was *hypercritical*. *syn:* faultfinding
- 8. **ignominy** (ĭg´nə mǐn ē) *noun* public shame, disgrace, or dishonor
 One simple act of greed made the mayor fall from fame to *ignominy* in one week.

 syn: disgrace, infamy

 ant: renown, eminence, repute
- 9. **impeccable** (ĭm pĕk´ə bəl) *adj*. faultless; without sin or blemish Because her house was always *impeccable*, she won an award. *syn:* immaculate, faultless, irreproachable *ant:* fallible, blameworthy
- 10. **implacable** (ĭm plā' kə bəl) *adj.* cannot be appeased or pacified His hatred toward those who had killed his wife and child was *implacable*. *syn:* inflexible, relentless, uncompromising *ant:* pacified, assuaged
- 11. **inane** (ĭn ān') *adj*. without sense or meaning; silly; empty

 That was an *inane* comment she made about the minister's white teeth.

 syn: foolish, insipid ant: significant, meaningful
