- 1. **noxious** (nŏk´shəs) *adj*. harmful to the health
  There was a *noxious*, overpowering smell in the dimly lit room.

  syn: injurious, unwholesome

  ant: harmless, wholesome
- 2. **nuance** (nōō´äns´) *noun* a delicate variation in tone, color, meaning, expression There were *nuances* in these later speeches that only the sharpest of listeners picked up on.
- 3. **obese** (ō bēs') *adj.* extremely fat
  Though people don't usually recognize it, Santa Claus is actually *obese*.

  syn: stout, corpulent, rotund

  ant: emaciated, slender, gaunt
- 4. **obstreperous** (ŏb strĕp´ər əs) *adj.* boisterous; unruly
  The *obstreperous* mob was finally subdued with an icy blast from the fire hose.

  syn: noisy; uncontrolled

  ant: calm; obedient
- 5. **odium** (ō´dē əm) *noun* hatred; the state of being hated
  The teacher regarded the loudmouth student with *odium*.

  syn: anathema, abhorrence ant: love, adoration
- 6. **officious** (ə fîsh´əs) *adj*. offering unnecessary and unwanted advice or service The butler's *officious* treatment of the other servants caused many to complain to the king. *syn*: meddlesome, interfering *ant*: retiring, reticent
- 7. **ominous** (ŏm´ə nəs) *adj*. threatening; predicting evil We went on our picnic despite the *ominous* rain clouds. *syn:* foreboding, sinister *ant:* nonthreatening, comforting
- 8. **omniscient** (ŏm nĭsh´ənt) *adj*. having unlimited knowledge; knowing everything The narrator who is able to tell the reader what his characters are thinking or what is happening in two places at one time is called an *omniscient* narrator. *syn*: all-knowing
- 9. **ostensible** (ŏ stĕn´ sə bəl) *adj*. apparent; pretended; professed The *ostensible* reason for his actions were not his real reasons. *syn*: apparent, probable, evident
- 10. **ostracize** (ŏs´trə siz) *verb* to banish; to shut out from a group or society by common consent

When Tom married someone of a different religion, the tight little community ostracized him.

syn: banish, exile, blacklist ant: welcome, accept
