1. **circuitous** (sər **kyōō'** i təs) *adjective* indirect, roundabout

The irritated motorists were forced to take a *circuitous* route around the washed-out bridge, which took an extra hour.

syn: circular

ant: direct

2. **circumlocution** (sûf' kəm lō **kyōō'** shən) *noun* an unnecessarily wordy or evasive form of expression

Surprised by an unforeseen and weighty question, the politician's speech degenerated into empty phrases and *circumlocution*.

syn: roundabout

3. **deleterious** (děl´i tîr´ē əs) *adjective* having a harmful effect; injurious. Cigarette smoking is *deleterious* to your health; it causes lung cancer, heart disease, and constricted blood vessels.

syn: destructive, pernicious

ant: beneficial

- 4. **extenuating** (ĭk **stĕn'** yōō ā' tǐng) adjective lessening the seriousness of Kevin claimed that extenuating circumstances prevented his timely appearance in court; however, the judge still held him in contempt of court.

  syn: justifying
- 5. **inchoate** (ĭn kō' it) adjective unformed or undeveloped
  The plan could not possibly go into effect at this time as it is still in an inchoate stage.

  syn: incomplete, incipient
- 6. **largesse** (lär zhes') noun generosity
  The new arts center was a result of its wealthy patron's largesse.

  ant: stinginess
- 7. **luminous** (**lōō**' mə nəs) adjective bright; full of light
  The cathedral's *luminous* stained-glass windows shone above the heads of the worshippers.

  syn: brilliant

  ant: dull, dark
- 8. **majordomo** (**mā**' jər **dō**' mō) *noun* follower; butler
  The king instructed his most faithful *majordomo* to organize the festivities for the prince's wedding.
- 9. **perambulate** (pə răm' byə lāt') *verb* to walk about, stroll One older woman could not walk on her own even though she had *perambulated* for years before she got sick.
