- 1. **salient** (sā' lē ənt) adj. significant; conspicuous; standing out from the rest The salient facts of the case finally came to light during the eyewitness account.
- 2. **salutary** (**săl'** yə tĕr ē) *adj.* healthful; wholesome
 The country air had a *salutary* influence on the child's chronic cough. *syn: beneficial*ant: pernicious
- 3. **sang-froid** (sän **frwa'**) *noun* calmness; composure or cool self-possession Even though the heckler continued to harangue him, the speaker kept his *sang-froid*. *syn: aplomb* ant: uneasiness, perturbation
- 4. **sanguine** (**săng**' gwĭn) *adj.* cheerful; optimistic Sally's *sanguine* personality made everyone in her company pleased to be with her.
- 5. **sapient** (sā pǐ ənt) adj. wise; full of knowledge
 Although a sapient man, he pays little attention to worldly concerns.

 syn: sagacious

 ant: fatuous, inane
- 6. **saturnine** (sat er nin) adj. gloomy; sluggish
 The hostess' saturnine attitude caused the party to end early.

 syn: sullen, morose
 ant: genial
- 7. **savant** (sə vänt') noun a person of extensive learning; an eminent scholar Einstein was a savant who will always be remembered for $E = MC^2$.
- 8. **scintillate** (**sĭn'** tĭl āt) *verb* to sparkle; to twinkle; to sparkle intellectually The lights *scintillated* throughout the otherwise drab room.
- 9. **scurrilous** (**skûr**'ə ləs) *adj.* coarsely abusive; vulgar Blackbeard the pirate and his men would never have been accepted into society because of their *scurrilous* behavior.
- 10. **sedition** (sǐ **dǐsh'** ən) *noun* rebellion or resistance against the government The Confederate States of America were charged with *sedition* when they left the Union.
- 11. **sedulous** (**sej**'ə ləs) adj. hard working; diligent Everyone knew Jason would get ahead in the world because he was *sedulous* in all he undertook.
- 12. **sentient** (**sĕn'** shənt) adj. conscious; capable of feeling or perception

 No one knew if the girl in the coma was *sentient*, but they continued to hold and talk to her.
